

After the Flood: Portland Comes Through for FPL

"Did you hear that the basement of Brownstone School flooded on Friday?" This casual comment from a neighbor on Monday, July 11th was the first indication that The Friends of the Portland Library, who for many years have stored all of their donated books in the basement of Brownstone School, might have a problem.

Two hours later, FPL Executive Board Members were at Brownstone viewing the damage that resulted when more than five inches of rain fell in two hours on the afternoon of Friday, July 8th. Several feet of water had filled the basement of Brownstone School, destroying appliances, furniture and supplies used by the school cafeteria and Portland Youth Services.

In FPL's portion of the basement, the situation was equally bleak. Board Members were able to rescue some key FPL equipment like Book Sale signs, sign holders and a hand truck, but all 175 boxes of stored books were a complete loss, as were two book drop carts used to transport donated books from the main floor of Brownstone to the basement. Even more troubling, FPL had lost its storage space. Just three months before the Fall Book Sale, FPL had no books and nowhere to store any future donations.

The FPL Executive Board met on Monday, July 11th, the day we learned about the flooding. Board Member Phyllis Prokop immediately volunteered to allow FPL to temporarily store books in the basement of a new addition to her house. Once that critical issue was resolved, we decided to draft a press release seeking book donations. Finally, we scheduled three book intakes at the Portland Library to be held the last Saturdays of July, August and September.

That Friday the *Rivereast News Bulletin* ran a cover story, complete with photos of soggy boxes of books, describing FPL's situation. Library Director Janet Nocek sent our press release to the Friends of Connecticut Libraries. Within two days, we had offers of literally truckloads of books from Friends groups in Newtown, Darien, Salem and Simsbury. Although our space limitations did not allow us to accept books in such large quantities, we did accept generous donations of books from Russell Library in Middletown and libraries in Haddam and Tolland.

FPL held its first post-flood Library intake on July 30th. The response from Portland residents was overwhelming. Volunteers worked from 9:30 am until 6:00 pm sorting, packing and transporting massive quantities of donated books and audio visual materials. Our next intake took place on August 27th as Hurricane Irene was bearing down on Connecticut. Driving rain and the rush to make storm preparations did not deter Portland citizens from once again bringing countless boxes of donated materials to the Library. By our third and final Library intake on September 24th, we had the process of sorting, packing and transporting donated materials down to a science, and FPL had plenty of books to hold a substantial Fall Book Sale. The Fall Book Sale, held from October 21-23 at the Library, was a resounding success, raising more than \$2,500 to support Library programs.

So where do things stand now for FPL? Although the majority of FPL's old space in Brownstone will now be used for educational purposes, the Town has generously agreed to provide us with a small storage area in Brownstone and to outfit that area with appropriate shelving. We are grateful to First Selectwoman Susan Bransfield and Paul Bengston (Director of Buildings and Grounds) for their help. We hope that this space will be ready in the near future. Because of the uncertainty as to exactly when the space will be available to us, FPL does not currently have any book intakes scheduled. We will use Rivereast articles, member emails and our new website (www.friendsofportlandlibraryct.org) to What's Inside communicate the new intake schedule as soon as possible.

FPL is tremendously grateful for the support that we have received in the aftermath of the flood from Portland residents, Town government and libraries and Friends groups across the State. We hope that you will continue to support FPL and the Portland Library by sending in the enclosed membership form today.

FPL's Annual Book Sale Raises \$2,500

The Friends held another successful book sale during the weekend of October 21-23. The Annual Book Sale. which is FPL's largest fundraising event (other than the Membership Drive) raised more than \$2,500 this year. FPL's book sale is a much anticipated event for many area residents. It's a great opportunity to stock up on reading material for the upcoming long winter season.

In July we didn't think that we would have a book sale. When the Brownstone Intermediate School basement flooded, our entire inventory of collected books (175 boxes) was destroyed. We reached out to our community through the Rivereast and television news coverage seeking donations of gently used books, puzzles and audiovisual materials. As the saying goes, be careful what you wish for! The Friends received so many donations in such a short time that our temporary storage facility was filled to the rafters. In three short months, we collected more materials than we lost in the flood. This generosity made us realize how fortunate we are to live in such a caring community; the overwhelming support was more than we could ever have imagined.

As always, setting up the Annual Book Sale was a major challenge. Our small but eager group of volunteers worked in earnest Thursday afternoon and evening to move the books from our storage facility to the Library, where they were quickly loaded on to tables.

When the doors opened on Friday evening, a line of anxious buyers was waiting to search the tables for their favorite authors, discover a rare edition, or settle in with a classic. Sales were brisk throughout the weekend, and the Friends donated all remaining books, games, puzzles and audiovisual materials to other local charitable organizations, such as Connecticut Easter Seals, Goodwill Industries, Read to Grow, Portland Youth Services and local schools, who will use these materials to supplement their programs.

The Friends would not be able to run a successful Annual Book Sale without our volunteers. This year's volunteers included students from St. Mary's CCD program, PMS, PHS, Vinal Technical High School, Mercy and Xavier High Schools, the Teen Advisory Board, the Youth Action Council and staff from the Public Works Department and the Portland Library. Many thanks to Portland Fire Department Company #1 for the use of their tables and to Portland Library and BIS for the use of their facilities. Finally, we would like to thank the many Friends' members who spent countless hours organizing, planning and executing the event--especially Board Member Phyllis Prokop who, in addition to overseeing all aspects of the book sale weekend, allowed FPL to take over the basement of her home for three months.
